



**Crack the Crises Policy Asks for the G7**

Crack the Crises is an unprecedented coalition representing 12 million British citizens and nearly 100 organisations. We have come together because 2021, when the UK hosts both the G7 and the COP climate talks, is our country’s chance to play our part in ensuring people and planet are protected. If we are to crack the crises and create a healthier, greener, fairer world, we need simultaneous action on climate, nature and inequality. Most urgently of all, we must beat Covid.

When G7 leaders meet from 11-13 June in Carbis Bay, they must deliver the following:

Crisis	Policy Ask
Crack the Covid Crisis	<p><b>Deliver at least \$36bn as the G7’s share of the \$66bn</b> that is needed in 2021/22. There should be a clear burden sharing agreement to reach the full financing requirement, which will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Fill the immediate ACT-A funding gap of \$19bn</b></li> <li>• <b>Enable ACT-A to reach more people, faster</b></li> <li>• <b>Begin to cover some urgent in-country costs</b> to ensure vaccines and other tools can be delivered and health care workers are funded, embedding a comprehensive primary health care approach to pandemic response which future efforts will build on.</li> </ul> <p><b>Deliver a comprehensive vaccine roadmap</b>, including clear costings on what is needed to produce, procure and deliver vaccines and other tools to get to full coverage in LICs and MICs and make sure countries have the necessary human and financial resources to deliver, ensuring a comprehensive primary health care approach.</p> <p><b>Mobilise the additional finance needed to deliver the plan to vaccinate the world</b>, using all possible finance tools to raise the amounts necessary, including, but not limited to, SDRs, funds from MDBs and new sources of funding, including innovative mechanisms and beyond government funding.</p> <p><b>Commit to supporting the TRIPS waiver</b> so that developing countries can produce their own vaccinations.</p> <p><b>Commit to a time-bound plan to share all surplus doses with COVAX by the end of 2021</b> and implement it as soon as possible and in parallel to national vaccine roll out plans.</p>

	<p>Commit to a <b>Global Health Treaty</b> that ensures universal and equitable access to a comprehensive package of proven preventive measures such as water, hygiene &amp; sanitation for this and future pandemics.</p>
<p>Crack the Injustice Crisis</p>	<p>Commit to a <b>new issuance of at least \$650bn Special Drawing Rights</b> with a <b>reallocation to the poorest countries</b> consistent with their financing needs to respond to the Covid-19 pandemic.</p> <p>Commit to <b>debt relief and cancellation sufficient</b> to bring countries' debt down to levels consistent with sustainable development and addressing the climate crisis, and include participation of all stakeholders, particularly private creditors.</p> <p>Express collective commitment to addressing each G7 nation's role in perpetuating <b>racial injustice</b>.</p> <p>Change power structures, process and funding through a "<b>localisation revolution</b>" whereby significantly increased resources are made available for local communities and leaders so more gets through to empower locally-led development.</p> <p>Commit to meeting the <b>UN target of 0.7% of quality poverty-focused ODA immediately</b> and ensure there are no cuts to the proportion of GDP allocated to ODA at a time when poorer countries are facing multiple crises.</p> <p>Establish dedicated policy initiatives and issue a statement on G7 support for <b>civic space and open societies</b>.</p> <p>Fully adopt the <b>Girls' Education Declaration</b> and global targets to get 40 million more girls in school and 20 million more reading by age 10, and contribute the <b>G7's fair shares commitment of \$3.5bn to the Global Partnership for Education</b> for their 2021-2025 replenishment.</p> <p>Commit to investing <b>2% of GDP in the care economy</b> and supporting countries around the world to do the same, including through promoting progressive domestic resource mobilization and debt relief.</p> <p>Prioritise and increase spending to prevent <b>violence against women and girls</b>, both nationally and as part of development and humanitarian assistance. Value and promote the expertise of women and girls by ensuring that VAWG programmes are informed and led by women's rights organisations and girl-led groups and increase ODA and humanitarian ODA for local responders dedicated to these vital organisations.</p> <p>Commit to <b>prevent famine and reduce malnutrition</b> through development of transparent, inclusive, accountable and multi-year national implementation plans for the Famine Prevention and Humanitarian Crises Compact. Drive donor efforts for the <b>Year of Action on Nutrition</b> leading to sustainable, reliable financial commitments for nutrition at the Nutrition for Growth Summit.</p> <p>Work towards <b>global reform of international trade</b> to ensure it is fair, sustainable and delivers on net zero commitments.</p>

<p>Crack the Nature Crisis</p>	<p>Commit to signing the <b>Leaders Pledge for Nature</b> and the <b>High Ambition Coalition for Nature</b>.</p> <p>Commit to the target of at least <b>30% of land and sea protected by 2030</b>.</p> <p>Commit to clear standards and safeguards for <b>nature-based solutions</b> projects that ensure they are nature positive, uphold the rights of indigenous peoples and local communities, and are compatible with science and the goals of the Paris Agreement and the CBD.</p>
<p>Crack the Climate Crises</p>	<p>Ensure that <b>all G7 spending and investments to support economic recovery after the pandemic are consistent with the goal to limit global temperature rise to 1.5°</b>.</p> <p><b>Significantly increase commitments and disbursements of climate finance and ensure that the \$100bn climate finance target</b> is met this year. Achieve a <b>50% target for climate change adaptation</b>, a key priority for 2021. Funding for adaptation should prioritise the most vulnerable countries and communities and not compromise non-climate ODA.</p> <p><b>End all support from G7 countries for all fossil fuels overseas</b> and significantly scale up support to lower-income and vulnerable countries to ensure renewable energy access for all.</p> <p>Establish a new <b>loss and damage finance window</b> that is additional to existing climate finance for adaptation and mitigation and make ambitious pledges to fund this window above and beyond existing finance.</p> <p>Commit to publishing a roadmap by the first G7 Finance Ministers meeting of 2022 detailing how they will <b>phase out fossil fuel subsidies by 2025</b>.</p>
